

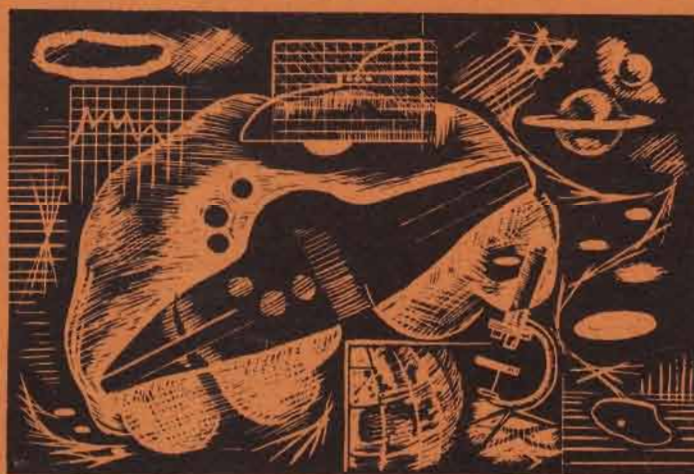

### EDITORIAL

This may be the last issue of the LUFORO Bulletin. But—do not despair—flying saucers have not disappeared—nor have our members all left. On the 25th of January the London UFO Research Organisation will be invited to take a fresh step into the unknown and to become the British UFO Research Association. If they accept, the Bulletin will turn into the BUFORA journal and bulletin and we shall become a 'national' association seeking to serve the whole country. The journal will be issued quarterly but will contain more material than the bulletin. The editorial policy will be more or less the same because you will be enduring the same editor. Did I hear anyone ask, what is the editorial policy? Very well, this seems an appropriate time to answer this question.

Before one has a policy one has opinions or beliefs from which the policy arises. My opinion on the subject of flying saucers is that when one has exhausted all the varieties of possible explanations for sightings there remain a number which cannot be other than attributable to the operations of extra-terrestrial machines. This belief would be sufficient reason alone for considering their study important. But I think there is a more cogent reason. I do not regard the events of the last decade as in any way new in the history of the earth but merely as an increase in a surveillance that may have been carried on since before there was a species homo sapiens. The increase has been provoked by our actions, by our atomic bomb explosions, by our rockets and by our space probes to Mars and Venus. When mankind is able to leave the bounds of earth it represents a potential threat to those who exist outside. What more natural, then, than that their surveillance should be stepped up?

This increased activity on both sides brings with it the gravest problem that has ever confronted humanity, that of our continued existence as a species. If you mentioned this to the man-in-the-

street he would think you were referring to the danger of nuclear warfare. But I believe there is a far greater danger involved in our lack of knowledge of these machines and the creatures who operate them. The creatures of earth, with their long history of war and mutual self-destruction are moving out into a realm where their power will be infinitesimal compared with that of the inhabitants, and on the few who enter this realm the fate of the whole species may depend. It is of the nature of man to go exploring, but it is better that he should do it with knowledge than with ignorance. 'Fools rush in.....'

These then are my beliefs—and the policy naturally follows. It is to stimulate thought on this subject by all means possible, to search for pattern in the bewildering phenomena reported and to attempt to dispel the dangerous ignorance of men who enter the realm of creatures more powerful than themselves.

This is the reason why original—even controversial articles are welcomed, why a section, 'The Year's Reports' was initiated in an endeavour to seek out the pattern of operations pursued and why your continued support by sending in reports and attending meetings is essential. We are slowly but surely moving out of the situation where a belief in flying saucers was ridiculed and this coincides with an increase of activity that reminds one of 1954. We are better equipped than we were then, but we cannot do without prompt news of a sighting. So please—send that cutting or write that letter straight away—we need it!

#### SIGHTINGS AT SALTWOOD, NEAR HYPHE, KENT

This should only be regarded as an interim report as there are a number of points still obscure which will have to be elucidated by correspondence with the people concerned. One of the things impressed on me during this investigation is the fact that a written report can sometimes present a very ambiguous picture which can only be resolved by a discussion with the author.

The incidents all took place in the neighbourhood of the Sandling road which goes north from Saltwood village past Sandling station, eventually joining the A20.

The first occurrence took place about 11.30pm in August 1962. Bruce Leggatt, now an 18-year-old student, had just ridden on his scooter past Sandling station when the air turned cold. Previously the night was very warm. He became afraid, accelerated and looked over his shoulder. He caught a glimpse of a yellow, oval object, seemingly opaque, appearing rough in outline and extending from one side of the road to the other (about 20 feet). He did not look round again because he was very frightened. He had the feeling something was following him—a feeling that persisted until he had gone some distance along the A20. He states that where he saw the shape on Sandling road it would have been impossible for it to have been caused by the lights of a car going through a patch of fog.

The first of the recent series of incidents occurred about 9pm on the 16th of November, 1963. Four teenagers, three boys and a girl, were walking to Sandling station in order to see the girl on her train. One of the boys, Tony Harrison, a 17-year-old art student,

gave me the bulk of information relating to this incident. While they were passing Brockhill school they saw what appeared to be a shooting star fall towards the Sandling station area. A little later they had just passed Slaybrook Corner (a right-angle bend) when a glowing object was seen above a hill on the left. No light was projected from it and it did not move. It was slightly oval (but more round than oval). The light was lost sight of behind trees as they walked down a dip in the road.

While descending this incline a figure was seen about 20-30 yards away on the road ahead on the right-hand side. It looked like a man with a scarlet cloak and had a lantern on the left. This lantern looked like a hurricane lamp and gave out a whitish light, flickering irregularly. Apparently it was not being swung backwards and forwards, but maintained the same position relative to the body. It was not possible to see the upper part of the body because the light was not strong enough (this probably explains the headless figure descriptions occurring in various reports). The figure walked slowly.

When they reached the road leading to the station (a turning on the right), the figure, which had reached the centre of a bridge over the railway, disappeared. It is reported that in view of its position it could not have turned down a side road. (I suggested to Tony Harrison that it might have disappeared because the light it was carrying went out, but he does not think this likely).

The boys saw nothing on the way back from the station.

The next incident occurred at 9.15pm on the 21st of November. Two boys and two girls were coming back from Slaybrook corner when one of them looked round and saw a golden mist coming towards them. They ran some distance and two of them looked round again, seeing a golden light lighting up the football pitch and covering an area about 20 feet by 20 feet. They all ran towards Saltwood village.

The next day about 8pm two boys and three girls (probably in a car) were on the way to Sandling station when one girl saw a star drop out of the sky to the Slaybrook area. Returning from the station they saw a light come over the trees a mile away and settle in a field about 100 yards from the road. The same girl who had seen the (shooting?) star walked towards the light, saw a dark figure, stopped, for some reason turned round and ran and blacked out while running. This information is second-hand, as I did not interview any of the people directly concerned.

The same evening about 11pm five boys and two girls went along the Sandling road in a car to just beyond the station. The car was parked beside a quarry and the lights turned out. One of the girls pointed out a figure on the left in front of the car. Two boys and a girl got out and went down into the quarry, but saw none. They came back and the group drove off.

About a week later at approximately 8.15pm three boys were walking up the road towards Brockhill school. One of them, John McGoldrick, saw a dark figure standing between trees in a field on the left of the road. It looked like a human being, about 6 feet tall. John drew his companions' attention to it and it disappeared while they were looking at it. They walked past the school drive and, according to one of them, saw the figure again in the middle of the hockey field. They passed Slaybrook corner and entered a field on the left of the road, about half-way between the corner and the station. They climbed the rise in the field and half-way up one of them noticed a horrible smell like a dead corpse (when

rise and grabbed another's arm, pointing to a figure standing between two small bushes, and they both ran back to the road. Realising they had left their companion behind they ran back again to the spot where they had observed the figure. The one who had experienced the smell noticed it had gone. They found their friend on top of the rise, saw the figure once more, the mist came down around them and they ran back to Saltwood village.

This does not complete the list of incidents—I shall take up the story at a later date. However, I believe you will probably agree that this is one of the most bizarre series of occurrences we have yet encountered. Until I have had an opportunity to make further enquiries I feel it would be premature to draw definite conclusions. It does, nevertheless, appear that the yellow objects seen were flying saucers. The nature of the figures is more obscure and you are advised to treat some of the more sensational reports with reserve. One aspect that I am investigating is the exact meaning attached to the word 'disappear'. For instance, in one example the observer meant that he lost sight of the object because his own movement led to a second object blocking the view of the first. I would not have suspected, before our discussion, that this was what he meant by 'the object disappeared'.

#### NEWS FROM AUSTRALIA

The most interesting news we have received recently from Mr Livingstone, our Australian representative, is of a series of sightings in the Mt. Gambier district in May of last year.

On the 15th nine people in a car were followed by an object for about 22 miles while travelling towards Glenburnie, near Mount Gambier. The object is described as fuchsia-red, oval-shaped, about 12 feet in diameter, and as having a short spike at the top and a longer spike at the bottom.

On the 18th a business man was travelling at 45mph in his car when he began to get interference on his car radio. This (a buzzing sound) became louder until he couldn't receive anything, not even the local station. Then he saw a light coming from behind the car. The object came over the car and landed  $\frac{1}{4}$  mile in front. It was about 30 feet wide, but so bright its height could not be estimated. It took off again when he dipped his headlights. The radio returned to normal after the object had disappeared.

On the 19th a young mechanic was driving from Glencoe to Mount Gambier when he saw an object at one side of the road in front. He thought it was a bull-dozer, but then it lit up. It then moved across the road and shot up as he drove underneath. It followed him for about  $1\frac{1}{2}$  miles and then disappeared as though the light had been switched out.
